With its entrance tucked away between the Rectory and the garage, the OLM Boutique could go unnoticed, but that is clearly not the case. Stroll through and you will find that it is *filled* with treasures – items donated by parishioners because they aren't being used, they've been replaced or just to make room at home! No matter the reason, parishioners share their bounty with the community by donating dishes, glasses, decorative items, clothing, religious articles, books and toys.

On any Monday through Saturday, you will find the ladies of the OLM Boutique bustling about in their basement store, folding, hanging, sorting, straightening, or helping someone to find a particular item. The people of the parish are very generous, giving items that are like new, including formal wear, suits – even the occasional leather jacket.

The one day when all who work in the OLM Boutique are together is for their annual luncheon, so I stopped by the Milleridge Inn to hear more about their experiences at the Boutique and what it means to them. This is a group of gentle women who listen eagerly to each other's stories, laugh easily and obviously enjoy their time together.

Each day at the Boutique is a community event. People come in to bring donations, chat and share the news of the day. Others come in need, perhaps looking for a suit for an interview, or clothing or toys for children. One of the women said, "We have regular visitors, people who come in every week. You get to know them and what they might need. For example, there is a man who checks our boutique to see what he can provide for families in his parish."

Cultivating an "Attitude of Gratitude" from Our Sunday Visitor, July 2011

How do you react when things don't go as you expect? Are you judgmental and impatient? Unsettled and unhappy? Most of us are! Cultivating an "attitude of gratitude" – a response that looks for and is grateful for the hidden "gifts" in the unexpected situation – is one way to be a good steward of the difficult moments life sometimes presents to us.

When a friend leaves our workplace to take a new job, we can be disgruntled at the loss of her companionship on the job and unhappy about the potential increased workload – or we can rejoice with her at the new opportunity and be grateful for the friendship we've enjoyed over the years. When rain cancels the family picnic plans, we can complain about the weather – or break out the playing cards or the Monopoly game and share a little indoor "quality time." When the little league game goes into extra innings or the soccer team wins and moves on to yet another game tonight, we can fret about it interfering with the next thing on the schedule – or we can buy another bag of popcorn, and relax, knowing that our children's happy memories are probably being made out on the field.

When we're traveling to new places and the accommodations are not what we were anticipating, an attitude of gratitude can help us rejoice that at least the linens are clean and the plumbing is adequate – and then perhaps lead us to explore why things are done differently here. If a menu is filled with unfamiliar food, instead of searching for something "recognizable," do you consider it an invitation to try something new? Are rude or preoccupied commuters on the subway or the train a source of irritation or an opportunity to "people watch" and wonder about their lives and circumstances? Is a flight cancellation a cause for anger – or, after alternate arrangements have been made, an opportunity to enjoy a new book?

Good stewards look for the best in every situation and rejoice in it. They know that all is gift – even the unexpected bumps in the road – and they seek to receive gratefully and use responsibly each precious moment sent by the Lord. Cultivating a consistent and intentional attitude of gratitude makes them more flexible in unfamiliar situations and more comfortable with change. Try it! This summer, when life takes an unanticipated turn, see if you can find something good about the new situation instead of complaining that it isn't what you'd planned. It isn't always easy, but it's always good stewardship!


