With our semi-annual Blood Drive approaching on January 8th, we thought it appropriate to highlight a parishioner who has become a blood donor "regular". There are so many generous people in the parish who donate at our blood drives each and every time in January and June. However, James Decker, doesn't stop there. Jim knows how very valuable human blood is...there is just no substitute. In addition to donating at Our Lady of Mercy, Jim spends two hours every three weeks at the Long Island Blood Services Donor Center where he donates platelets, one of the components of whole blood. He began these donations on Sep-

tember 15, 1993 and hasn't stopped since. Platelets cannot be harvested at local blood drives such as those we have at OLM since special machinery is required. When asked why he is so committed to this practice, he indicated that it gives him a good feeling knowing that he is helping others in need. He said that when he receives emails from Long Island Blood Services telling him that his platelets were given to a patient at one of the local hospitals, he knows he made a difference in someone's life.

Jim was recently recognized by LI Blood Services for having made over 200 lifetime platelet donations to date, 211 to be exact. Jim truly practices stewardship by donating the very valuable treasure of his blood.

In addition to being a faithful blood and platelet donor, Jim volunteers his time and talent in numerous ways at Our Lady of Mercy. He is an Usher at Sunday Mass, an Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist, and an active member of the Holy Name Society, the Joseph F. Lamb Knights of Columbus and the Our Lady of Mercy Prayer Group. Stewardship Spirituality truly is a way of life for Jim Decker, and are fortunate to have him as part of our parish family here at Our Lady of Mercy.

Can I Donate?

There are actually fewer limitations that you might think! Age is not a factoras long as you are healthy. Taking medication? Most maintenance meds won't exclude you, but NYBC has a list you can check to be sure. Go online to www.nybloodcenter.org for a complete checklist.

So, Tell Me About Platelets

During a platelet donation, 1/4 pint of your blood is drawn and passed through a cell-separating machine. The machine collects the platelets and safely returns the remaining blood components, along with saline, back to you.

Patients who need platelets include those undergoing chemotherapy, organ transplant or with weakened immune systems. A platelet dose from a single donor is beneficial since it reduces the patient's exposures.

Accepting God's Call

It is in the Annunciation, in Mary's fiat—"I am the servant of the Lord. Let it be done to me as you say"- that brought our Savior into the world. As the first disciple of Christ, Mary shows us that we must listen to and do God's will. *Prayer* and *action* therefore go hand in hand. As followers of Christ, we must make time to talk to and listen to Him in prayer.

Examining all that we do, or simply living in the light of our prayer is essential. Living with a heart open to God's will has enormous implications. Different people will realize that God calls them to different things. For a teen, it may mean resisting peer pressure to take part in drinking or unchaste activity. For the single adult, it could require offering personal time in service to the needy. A businessman may find that honesty and fairness requires a certain course of action. A married couple could realize that they should have another child. A frightened pregnant woman

may understand that she needs to ask for help to resist the temptation of abortion. The sick person might have to accept his illness and join his suffering to that of Christ.

Doing God's will is not always easy. We usually have our own plans for our lives. It is good to have plans, but never at the expense of our growth in relationship with God. Like Mary, we must trust that God's will is the best for us and our world. Let's follow the example of Mary and call on her to help us open our hearts to say yes to God!

While we may not view ourselves as saints, we too are called to such heroic service right within our own community. We have many service opportunities right here within our own parish. If you have the willingness to serve and take the initiative to find where you are needed, you will find that there is no end to those who truly need help.

As stewards, we are called to serve both within the Church and also for the wider society. As we contemplate where to use our gifts, we need to evaluate what we do best. Stewardship Spirituality helps a community of faith mature and renders the leadership of the parish responsible and accountable. After all, the parish belongs to the parishioners along with their priests. Ask yourself what you have to offer in terms of material and creative resources. And in support of your parish, join the workers in the Lord's vineyard. When we put our heart into it, it is a great way to use our time to tell God, "I love you, and I'm grateful for all You have given me."

As we move into a new year, let us take time to plan and make stewardship of time and talent a part of our lifestyle and stewardship of treasure a part of our budget.

Your first responsibility is to take care of your needs and the needs of your family—not necessarily all their wants. In looking at what we need versus what we want, we end up placing material things and money in their proper perspective.

All too often, Stewardship Spirituality is presented only with Church support or charitable funding as the goal. This is too limiting: Stewardship Spirituality is a plan, method, practical means to grow as a disciple of Jesus Christ and a member of the His Church.
