Profiles in Stewardship: Serving Those in Need By Lucia Fangmann

One Saturday in October, sporting a leather jacket, jeans and a Led Zeppelin tee shirt, Rich Zavada explained why the OLM Knights sponsor a Rocktober event. "It's about keeping the kids involved in their parish. Making this the place they want to come to have fun and spend time with friends. And God knows I love this music! I'd do it just for that," Rich called out, as the teen band served up 70's rock and roll anthems from the Mercy auditorium stage for their friends and family – and the Knights served up the snacks.

Pillars of Hospitality: A vital source of Rich's spirituality is his dedicated participation in the OLM Knights of Columbus. A past Grand Knight, Rich is ever-active in organizing and implementing projects that support our parish both fiscally and spiritually. The Knights host altar server and communion breakfasts, and St. Patrick's Day and Italian night dinners, among other social events

Rich's pride in the Knights is rooted in its history: its focus on eliminating prejudice, helping the poor and that one attains "degrees" through study, acts of charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism. One of Rich's fondest memories is of his close friendship with late, Dr. Vincent Genna, forged when they joined the OLM Knights together and based on mutual dedication and service.

Rich is in the OLM Knights of Columbus, leads the Right to Life Committee and is a member of the Lamplighter food rescue group.

Rich Zavada's call to conscience began in youth: an Eagle Scout, he received the Ad Altare Dei award (to the altar of God), and helped to train younger scouts. Rich credits his family life, their Catholic upbringing and morality for setting his path in life. As Rich asserted, he strives to, "talk the talk, *and* walk the walk."

As the foundation of his call to faith and service deepened, Rich believes he came to a deeper understanding of the sanctity of all Life. In his own words, "Life is valuable, life is everything...No one has the right to decide life or death, but God." The "torch" for the Right to Life committee was passed to Rich by longtime, exemplary supporter, Mary Murray. He organizes the trips to the March for Life, various Prayer Rallies among other events. His sincere hope is for the growth and rejuvenation of the dedicated base of Right to Life support within OLM. While we are all called, reality demands that our young people understand and respond to this call. The sanctity of life issue is imbued in what Rich terms the "continuing low regard for human life in a society where...animal rights figure more predominantly, than human right to life."

Rich truly lives a life of Stewardship Spirituality. He works for Keyspan where he is a member of the volunteer service group, the Lamplighters, who donate their lunch hours and after hours to help with food rescue in conjunction with Island Harvest. His family helps him in his efforts, and you can find his children Lorraine and Peter, or his wife Jadwiga assisting him in one of his many Works of Mercy.

Stewardship Prayer


Creator God,

Be with me as I choose each day



The Secret to Success

Msgr. Thomas McGread on Stewardship Spirituality

Contrary to popular belief, Stewardship Spirituality is not about raising money. It's not even about building up our parish ministries and increasing participation. Stewardship Spirituality is all about Christ. That is the most important thing to remember.

Sure, as we move toward stewardship as a way of life, our parish may see our offertories rise and our ministries may increase their numbers, but that should not be our focus. That's because stewardship begins with a conversion of heart. The true steward makes a commitment to the Lord – not merely to the parish. He gives his life to God because he wants to follow Him, and everything else – his time, his talent, and his treasure – follows suit.

That being said, however, it is important to recognize that some may come to this conversion of heart through their participation in parish ministries. For example someone who loves to knit may decide to join a Prayer Shawl ministry simply because it gives her an opportunity to do what she loves. Meanwhile, in doing so, she comes to interact with others who have given their lives to the Lord as His disciples. Their examples will inevitably have an impact on her. She is bound to see the joy in selfless giving, to recognize Christ working through them, an in that, she will grow closer to Christ.



Living Stewardship Spirituality: Creating Lenten Traditions

Putting Ideas into Action

You don't have to have a degree in religion to come up with your own Lenten traditions. Lent can be a time to step away from the normal routine to create new and sacred traditions that allow us to take the next step as we work to incorporate more prayer, service and meaning in our communal walk through the spiritual desert.

Your sacrifices and service should be a natural outgrowth of your family's interests, desires and talents. Find something that everyone might try and start slowly. Some families go without any "screen" time for all 40 days. Others add the Rosary or other prayers to their nightly routines. Whichever path a family chooses, the actions often blossom into treasured annual traditions and sometimes even into new routines that spill over into Ordinary Time and ordinary lives. Here are some more ideas:

Make a crown of thorns out of braided bread and toothpicks with a purple candle in the center. Each time a family member is "caught being Jesus" to someone else, a "thorn" is removed from the crown. The point is to remove all the thorns by Easter.

Author Mike Aquilina takes his children (aged 7 and up) to the **Chrism Mass** each year. "It's great for them to see all the priests together in force, and hear the priesthood spoken of in the stunning terms of the day's liturgy," he said. "Afterward we go out to celebrate the great feast day when Our Lord established such awesome sacraments."

Bring your children to Stations of the Cross. Outdoor Stations are especially good for young families because you are less likely o disturb others and the images are usually large and eye-catching. At OLM, the Stations of the Cross will be every Friday in the church at 9:30am and 7:30pm.

Encourage your children to **give away their time to the needy during Lent.** You can visit those in nursing homes, or others who are homebound.
(Hint: Contact Parish Outreach for information.)

It is important to teach our children to give to others, and let them know that Our Lord puts people all around us that we should serve in one way or another. You may not be changing the world, but hopefully Lent is changing you.



they did just that. They made family prayer time a daily practice in our home. They loved and cared for my siblings and me selflessly. They were highly involved in the life of our parish community – giving both their talents and their finances. And they did it all with a deep joy, a sincere gratitude, feeling as though it was a blessing that they were able to live for the Lord. We talked about what it meant to be a Catholic – to be a follower of Christ, but what spoke louder than their words, to me, were their examples. I saw how much they loved the Lord. I saw how much they gave back to Him. And I saw the joy that they received as they gave of themselves so selflessly. I learned, very early on, what it means to be a disciple of Christ.

So, when I became pastor – my main concern was bringing the people to Christ. With that intent, one of the first things I did at every parish where I served as pastor was hold a parish mission. Before the parishioners thought about getting involved in ministries, before I addressed the budget, I wanted them to understand that life as a Christian is all about God, and we, as Christians, must put God first. I asked a guest speaker to address the parishioners, inviting them to grow closer to God, and then I worked throughout my pastorate to keep the focus on Christ.

There you have it. The secret to stewardship success is Jesus Christ. Love Him. Serve Him. And invite others to do the same. That will make all the difference!
